Highway Code Revision Guide Answers

1. When you cannot see for 100 metres.
2. Ease of accelerator and slow down gradually.
3. De-icer, Ice Scraper, Torch, Warm Clothing, Boots, First Aid Kit, Jump Leads, Shovel, Food & Drink.
4. Remove all the snow that may fall off into the path of other road users.
5. Only if the lane you are going to use has been cleared.

7. Slow down gradually and make more space in front.
