All employers must conduct a risk assessment. Employers with five or more employees have to record the significant findings of their risk assessment.

We have started off the risk assessment for you by including two sample entries for current common hazards to illustrate what is expected. Look at how this might apply to your business/learning venue, continue by identifying the hazards that are the real priorities in your case and complete the table to suit.

You can print and save this template so you can easily review and update the information as and when required. You may find the HSE example risk assessments a useful guide (www.hse.gov.uk/risk/casestudies). Simply choose the example closest to your business.

Employers with five or more employees must have a written risk assessment.

It is important you discuss your assessment and proposed actions with staff or their representatives.

You should review your risk assessment if you think it might no longer be valid, eg following an accident in the workplace, or if there are any significant changes.
